Welcome to the first issue of the MICA User Group Newsletter!

We (your MICA trainers, Andy Hunter and Becca Mickels) are starting this user group and newsletter in response to multiple comments received on MICA training evaluations over the past three years. Many of you have requested communication on updates to the MICA system, descriptions of new features, additional exercises to help you practice your skills, announcements of training opportunities, and any other new information about data that might help you perform your jobs more efficiently.

We would especially like to feature stories describing your success at completing projects or obtaining grants using the MICA tools as well as interviews with public health professionals about your duties and how you use MICA to accomplish them.

Refresher Webinars

Many of our past class participants have expressed a need for periodic refreshers. We currently plan to offer live trainings at various locations next summer, but we realize that past participants may not need to sit through the same full-day training a second time. (However, you are certainly welcome to do so!) Instead, we are considering developing refresher webinars that will review some of the main points from Courses 1 and 2. We envision that these refresher sessions would last approximately one hour (or possibly somewhat longer for complicated topics like confidence intervals) and would be available at no cost. To help us determine which topics would be most useful to you, we have prepared a brief (two or three questions) survey which will allow you to choose from a list of proposed topics or submit your own ideas. New MICA Content Index

One of the critiques we frequently receive is that locating indicators within the MICA system is difficult. Our application developer, Dr. Bob Metzger, developed the MICA Content index, located at http://health.mo.gov/data/mica/mica/MICAlabel.html, to make locating indicators a little easier. Simply click on the plus sign (+) to expand each MICA topic or indicator grouping within the MICA topic. (If you click on the hyperlinked labels you will be taken to the MICA itself.) In the example below, we expanded MICA Contents, Births, and Birth Place: Very Low Birth Weight Births Delivered in a Level 3 Facility to see all indicators available below the drill-down hyperlink on Birth Place: Very Low Birth Weight Births Delivered in a Level 3 Facility. Once you click on the plus sign to expand a list, the plus sign will change to a minus sign (-). Click on the minus sign to collapse that grouping. This will allow you to search for a

particular indicator without having to create multiple tables by searching in the MICA itself. Bob is currently working on a more advanced search feature, which we will share with you as soon as it is complete.

Q&A

A comment on the course evaluations asked about the availability of city-level data. MICA only contains city-level data on Independence, Joplin, and Kansas City, which have their own health departments that are independent of the county health departments. (For example, there is an

Independence City Health Department that is separate from the Jackson County Health Department.) St. Louis City, which is an independent city, is treated as a county.

However, the *Annual Vital Statistics* reports include city-level data for some indicators. These reports are located at http://health.mo.gov/data/vitalstatistics/index.php. City-level data are available on the following tables:
